The Pastor's Ponderings

I remember watching the Cary Grant movie, "Room for One More," with my cousin when we were just children. I was quite taken with the line of one of the adopted children when he garnered an award. He said something to the effect of, "I had a head start on most kids; I got to choose my parents." At the time, my cousin, who was one of four ... all adopted ... reminded me that she did not have the option to choose as she was an infant when Joanne and Duane picked her up. I remember at that tender age of five or six thinking how luck she was. They chose her. Many of us did not have that opportunity.

The reason I am bringing this up is that one of my family, (not by birth,) has come home for hospice care with inoperable cancer. My mother and sister have been up to visit and to do what they can. Having heard them speak, they are feeling loss and grief. This man sat at the 'family table' with a small coterie at my siblings' weddings and my ordination. He, Ron, Tom and Patty had vacationed with us for twenty-five years. We have shared much of the world in his company. He has sent more gifts and cards than most. He is faithful, funny, (although a bit raunchy,) talented and educated. He is demanding and forgiving. And without sharing any DNA, he is family.

What constitutes a family? With all of the political rhetoric about saving a family, I am really wondering how to define this institution. In scripture, 'brothers' and 'sisters' often included cousins and distant relatives. In the Pentateuch, a family was being a member of a tribe ... hundreds of people at a time. Adoption has included outsiders' equal footing with the natural born since the earliest of times. Soldiers in the same platoon and members sharing the military base become "family."

And in the Spagnolo household, Chuck, Ron, Tom, and Patty are just as much family as they would be with the same gene pool. Maybe it would be a better world if we realized how we are related rather than informing others that their loved ones are not. Maybe it would be better for all of us to be more inclusive and less exclusive when bringing others to our hearts and homes. Maybe a family should be defined by the love of its members and little else.

Historian's Corner

A SALUTE TO ALICE GRINDLE

Our third longest church member died recently in a nursing facility in southern Florida. Alice Grindle was a great woman of faith who contributed immeasurably to our Brown Church.

Alice married businessman Ralph Grindle during World War II days. Ralph's mother was a longtime member of our church and a friend of many. Mrs. Grindle (Ona) was a pillar of the Ladies Social Circle and was a friend of Effie Smith - an aunt who brought up my mother. The two had attended the Redstone Church as children which was under the auspices of the North Conway Church. Ralph continued in the Congregational tradition and so did Alice. Many will remember that Ralph and Alice owned the Western Auto which stood at the "Four Corners" - which was beside the Conway Cafe - now Obama Headquarters. The store was huge by Conway standards. Whether you wanted tools, paint, wallpaper or a new bike, that is where you went to in the 1950's and 1960's. The building once was

the Conway Opera House back in the 1800's and it had been moved from a Washington Street location beyond the original liquor store.

Alice and Ralph raised two children - Peter and Susan. Both children were very personable and were loyal Sunday School students. Peter was frequently an acolyte. Peter married and had two girls but died at a young age. Susan married a local musical talent, Paul Sanborn, and moved south - all the way to Alton and had children too. Susan, with her fiery red hair, could not be missed. A group of her friends sang in the Chancel Choir while they were in high school. They loved doing things to make my mother laugh and jump like putting a tack in her chair during Sunday Services. She'd jump and they'd laugh. She obviously couldn't get after them during services and they knew it.

Ralph and Alice were pillars of the Church. Ralph joined the Men's Group, spearheaded by George T. Davidson. Alice was a founding member of Litahni and appeared in many of its plays (including The Hat Pageant of 1946) and fundraisers. The Grindles were also leaders of the Congo Club - a club established for couples of the Congo Church. They were both Sunday School teachers. Mr. Grindle taught fourth grade boys and Alice taught fourth grade girls. Classes were frequently gender separated then! The Grindles were also deacons - husbands and wives of long standing was the criteria then. Ralph was for many years the moderator of the Church. Alice was a fantastic cook and many of her recipes appear in the Church Centennial Cookbook.

We shall remember Alice fondly. her warm ingratiating smile masked a businesswoman's acumen. Nothing escaped Alice's eye and she possessed a great sense of humor. Alice formed many friendships and was one of the rare few who never had an enemy. We salute you, Alice Grindle and remember all of your good deeds.
