So, as I take my drive down the strip, I wonder how many of us really need to purchase that extra sweater or diamond pendant. I wonder how our Advent would look if we baked Christmas cookies for the aged widower who lives alone. I wonder if we spent the time teaching our children and grandchildren how to knit, quilt, or crochet, if that would become a fonder memory than receiving a gift card or video game. I wonder how much better it would be if our nursing home parking lot were as full as Settler's Green. I wonder what Advent would look like if we really had the Christmas spirit.

Historian's Corner

A Tribute to Charlotte Altenbern

In this time of thanksgiving, we can indeed be thankful for Charlotte Altenbern. She has raised a family in Conway, been "instrumental" in musical events long before we were called "The Valley," and she has been a fixture at the Brown Church for decades.

Born in Haverhill, Charlotte was the second of four children born to Edward and Louise Janes. She had an older brother, Allyn, and two younger sisters, Elizabeth "Libby," and Virginia. Elizabeth would later become a member of our church. For years a schoolteacher, you may have known her as Elizabeth Newton Cosby. Virginia was the most musical of all and sadly she died at age twenty-six after repeated seizures. When Charlotte was just fourteen, her mother died. Louise played both violin and piano, and Charlotte always wished that she had been able to share their love of music.

Charlotte first learned to play the piano at the age of six. Her mother's sister, Elsie, was her first instructor. A graduate of Woodsville High, Charlotte was also a graduate of the Unversity of New Hampshire where she majored in secretarial studies. At UNH, Charlotte took piano lessons for two years and had a recital there. Her most influential instructors were Mr. and Mrs. Donald Gage of Woodsville. The Woodsville Universalist Church figures prominently in this narrative. Charlotte's family lived right across the road from the church. One Sunday, when Miss Janes was about sixteen, the organist was away and Charlotte was asked to fill in. The pastor and his son were to do a duet. They started singing and young Charlote played in the wrong key. She was most shy then

and cried the rest of the day. Around that time, during the Hurricane of '38, the steeple blew of the church.

A wonderfully positive thing happened at the Woodsville Church, however. The very next minister was a Mr. Altenbern from Kansas. He had a son named Tom. but Tom was attending a junior college in Kansas. Their parents always said that the two would have to get together because they would be so fond of each other. Naturally Tom amd Charlotte hated each other because of the scheming of the parents. Tom and Charlotte met in 1939 and it was. despite this, love at first sight. Furthermore, Tom's brother Bob, was in Charlotte's class at UNH. Tom was in the Army while Charlotte was attending college. While he was stationed in Georgia, the two got married there. Married for just a few months, Tom was sent overseas to Europe and then the Pacific Theatre. Although married, Charlotte was very lonely even with family around in Conway. Such was the plight of so many young women at this time!

What prompted the Conway move? Mr. Janes had been the Superintendent of the Woodsville School District. He accepted a teaching offer at Kennett High in the Science Department. Mr. Janes became a prominent member of Second Congregational Church and became its treasurer for several years. Charlotte was a senior in Durham when this transpired and so she moved to Conway after graduation.

After the war, the Altenberns would have four children: Richard, David, Charlie, and Mary. Mary was named for her grandfather's oldest sister, who was like a grandmother to Charlotte and her siblings. The four all attended Sunday School, were prominent in the youth groups, and the

boys all served as acolytes. Tom was a tenor in the Chancel Choir. Charlotte served as the organist frequently during the Golden White years. From 1963-1969, she was organist not only at our church, but for three of those years was also organist in Madison! She estimates that she has substituted in nineteen local churches. She was the organist at the Madison Baptist Church for three decades. She served as accompanist for two decades for Frank Petillo's Eastern Slope Choral Society and later for the Mount Washington Choral Society. She was a fixture also at Kennett High School music festivals and holiday concerts for years and was especially close to the late Jean Fickett. When Charlotte retired from that, she was rather at loose ends. It was June Wiggin who suggested that she play as a duet with Petrina Paoletti at the church's Christmas Concert. Petrina called her up that day and the two became fast friends. "The atmosphere of those concerts and playing along with Petrina was the highlight of my musical life." The concerts were televised, the sanctuary was overflowing and it indeed became a Valley tradition.

Yes, Charlotte has been a "noteworthy" member of our community and we thank her for all of the precious moments she has given us!

Kairos Prison Ministry

As most of you know, I go into the State Prison in Berlin most Saturday mornings for a couple of hours to facilitate a prayer and share time for the inmates. The Department of Corrections will not allow this time of prayer unless there is a volunteer from the outside representing Kairos. I feel very blessed to have the opportunity to serve in this role. I also feel blessed to have my wife, Jill, join me several times throughout the year. We sing, share, and pray together. It is always such a rewarding time for me listening to the residents share; I get so much out of this sharing.

I would like to share with everyone an example of what these couple of

hours are like.

A few Saturdays ago, we had an inmate attend that wanted to share with the group a joy in his life. He stood at the podium and thanked God for where he was! He understood that God put him into this prison for a reason and that he only needed to follow Jesus' light. He admitted that he would not be alive now had it not been for him being sent to prison. He was pulled out of the life he was living to take a 'time out' with God and really see where he was going.


This talk was followed up by each inmate coming up to the podium on their own and sharing how God has blessed them by being in prison.

I could only think to myself how blessed I was with having a such caring and loving family when I was growing up, having such a caring and loving family now, and having such a caring and loving Church family that I now enjoy.

And I pray that I will never take these for granted!

Please begin thinking praverfully, progressively, and proportionally about your giving. In the current uncertainty of our financial times, you may have pause about declaring a pledge, but we would encourage you by writing that now is the perfect time to stand up and claim your priorities. Now is the time to say, this is my church family and it is an ultimate priority. It is where I receive my spiritual nourishment. It is the place that challenges me to live beyond the voice of culture to the freer life of faith.

Our budget totals \$167,500 for the year 2013. Of that number, \$60,000 is the pledge goal; \$20,000 from our trust fund; \$11,000 from the general building fund and \$60,000 from the various fundraising events held during the year.

You are a congregation of generous people. May you give generously of your time, talent and treasure to the church's ministry and mission this year. As you give, may you know the joy of giving and the satisfaction of knowing what an important presence this church is to each of us personally and to our community.
