Note from the Secretary

We celebrate our fathers on the their sixth child. Mr. Smart was third Sunday of June. It is a time left to raise the newborn and his President Calvin Coolidge, in to honor the men who have been a great influence in our lives. I was interested in finding out just how Father's Day originated.

Sonora Dodd, of Washington, first had the idea of a "father's day." She thought of the idea for Father's Day while listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909.

Sonora wanted a special day to honor her father, William Smart. Smart, who was a Civil War veteran, was widowed when his wife died while giving birth to

other five children by himself on a rural farm in eastern Washington state.

After Sonora became an adult she realized the selflessness her father had shown in raising his children as a single parent. It was her father that made all the parental sacrifices and was, in the eyes of his daughter, a courageous, selfless, and loving man. Sonora's father was born in June, so she chose to hold the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane, Washington on the 19th of June, 1910.

1924, supported the idea of a national Father's Day. Then in 1966 President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day. President Richard Nixon signed the law which finally made it permanent in 1972.

For most of us, our father's have played a large role in our lives. I was truly blessed to have had a loving Christian father, who was such a great role model to me.

Trustee's Comments

There are great opportunities for everyone to step up and make a contribution to the beautification and renovation of the Little Brown Church. If you ask, "What Can I Do?" give me a call and we'll work something out. We have begun with the removal of several trees and I suggest some trimming of the maple tree out 6. The sanctuary carpet needs front will complete the tree issue. Here's a suggestion of ways you can support our endeavors with; your time, your talent, or your treasure:

- 1. Relocate the church sign to where the birch tree stood
- 2. Remove the playground and fence

- 3. Clean up the cinderblocks and other trash where the trees were removed
- 4. Help pay the \$500 to remove the stumps
- 5. Put a team together to paint Fellowship Hall or offer to pay the cost of having it painted. \$850.
- to be removed and the pews carried out to refinish the floors. \$3,500 and some manual labor will lead the way.
- 7. If you really feel ambitious help us raise \$40,000 to make the renovations to the sanctuary.
- 8. Here's a thought; someone to paint the trim around the doors out front.

These are the things that need action now. We'll tackle the outside projects later, i.e. repairing and staining the shingles as well as any remaining roof issues. The point is we have begun and we cannot stop now. If we don't leave our legacy for those who follow us, who will? The Brown Church is 108 years old. Will it be around to serve Christ in this community for the next 100 years? We can have a lot to say about that. Let's do our part!

Historian's Corner

THE MEETINGHOUSE

Many are confused over the relationship of the White Methodist Church to the Congregationalists. We understand that the Methodist Church is fighting for its survival which is indeed a tragedy. We hope that this little article will be of benefit.

The church at 121 Main Street was built back in 1826. It was the first public building in the village. It was financed by the selling of pews. Congregationalists had the majority of members but there were Methodists as well. It was thus agreed that no denomination would have sole use of the building. For sixty years, until 1886, the "meetinghouse" in Conway had no Congregational minister of its own. The pastor of the North Conway was the pastor of the Conway church also. During the latter part of this time, the pastor was the esteemed Girard Norcross. At his recommendation and upon his retirement, a separate organization was formed and called the Second Congregational Church. Meanwhile, the Methodists had

their own pastors from the end of the Civil War on: Isaac S. Cushman (1866-1868); George W. Barber (1868-1870); S.F. Strout (1870); Joseph Hawkes (1871-1872); W.H. Turkington (1873); Charles W. Bradley (1874); H.B. Mitchell (1875-1876); Frank W. Smith (1877); John Collins (1878-1880); Daniel W. Waterhouse (1880-1883); and J. A. Woodbury (1885-1887). Imagine - all of these pastors served during the service of the one Congregational minister! The late Ruth (Towle) Morrill gave the aforementioned information

The Methodists and Congregationalists split over a political issue from the Civil War. Billie Eastman. a staunch Copperhead, stomped out of the meetinghouse when the Congregational pastor prayed for the soldiers. Billie (owner of the present Historical Society home), was the first to offer to help to finance a Methodist pastor. Eventually the Methodists held their own services on the Sabbath morning while the Congregationalists held services on alternating Sunday evenings as the trip was difficult for Reverend Norcross. The joint use of the church existed until 1906 when our struc-

ture was built. We had offered to buy out the Methodists' share in the pews or to sell our own. The Methodists decided to remain in the white meetinghouse and we decided to build. Incidentally, the church steeple, according to historian Janet Hounsell, was originally 110 feet. It was lowered to ninety feet after lightning struck it in 1921.

Thankfully, the Methodist and Congregational Churches have cooperated beautifully for many decades. We have had joint youth groups as well as joint Vacation Bible Schools. We have worked together on many community programs to benefit the citizens of Conway. Many individual pastors have formed great friendships with each other as have our communicants. Here is a toast to both denominations!
