After the flooding that occurred in late August and after the loss of property due to that flood, many of us have been trying to figure out how to acquire the necessary assistance to feed, clothe, and shelter some of the hardest hit. Some of us have been trying to crunch numbers to find the moneys to repair damaged water heaters and furnaces. Some of us have been scratching our heads wondering how we could have not been prepared for flooding in a flood plain. Some of us have been angry that organizations have been lax or passing the buck.

But, in Laconia, NH, a young man, a teenager, in fact, decided to take matters into his own hands. After hearing of the flooding of the Conway Village Congregational Church's basement and learning of the many fine services that the said church does for the community, this young man, (who wishes to remain unnamed,) took charge and did two things. Firstly, he spoke with his peers and had a food drive to help stock the shelves of our food pantry. Secondly, he stood up in front of his congregation and gave an impassioned plea to his church. This teen's efforts raised some four hundred dollars and much food.

Wonderful, isn't it, that there are people in the world who actually care enough to take a stand and make a difference. Without compensation of any kind, some people understand that to be a church, the Body of Christ, there are times to roll up one's sleeves and pitch-in. What a blessing to give without desire to receive. What joy to share a selfless love that finds its origin in the love of God! What comfort it is to see Jesus in others and be Jesus to others.

Our lives have been filled with stories of those heroes that have made a difference. We read our history and learn of American greats who worked diligently for equality and human dignity. Fryeburg Fair Apple Crisp Job Descriptions

What do the people in the kitchen do?

- Peel and core the apples using a commercial apple peeler/corer.
- Slice the apples into sections and finish coring/peeling.
- Measure and package dry mix ingredients for each crisp pan.
- Prepare apple crisp for baking.
- Bake apple crisps for 30-40 minutes.
- Store in refrigerator for pick up the next morning.



Then number of apple crisps needed each day varies due to the weather. The goal is to have a total of 200 apple crisps ready at the booth and the kitchen every day.

What do the people in the booth do?

- Someone bakes off the apple crisps in the oven at the booth.
- Someone fills the crisps cups with apple crisps
- Someone scoops the ice cream on the apple crisps. Also gets to have fun with the people.
- Someone talks to people, yells out the order for all to hear, and takes the money. (This person has all the fun.)



Working in the booth can be done with two people in the morning, four in the afternoon, and three at night, except on the weekends. We really need 5 people in the both Saturday and Sunday of both Weekends.

Neighbors In Need Special Mission Offering

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on October 16, supports the USS's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the U.S. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's and direct service projects. Through UCC-TakeAction.org, our national supports our American In-Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources. new updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousand of UCC justice and

peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work Wisconsin, and northern on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also dian neighbors in the UCC. One -third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa,

Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1.000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other USS congregations in the U.S.
